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BI-PARTISAN FAIRTAX BURSTS ONTO CAPITOL HILL SCENE

"I Believe the American People Want This Change"

Positive reaction has been swift to the introduction of the bi-partisan FairTax legislation on Capitol Hill. The FairTax bill is the product of a nationwide grassroots movement for comprehensive tax reform.

"Georgia Rep. John Linder introduced a bipartisan plan Wednesday to abolish the Internal Revenue Service and replace the federal income and payroll taxes with a 23 percent national sales tax on all new goods and services. 'I believe the American people want this change,' said Linder, an Atlanta Republican. 'They want simplification; they want no favoritism and this will give it to them - a transparent, voluntary system.'" - David Pace, The Associated Press, July 14, 1999.
